#### MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR 1



#### **Dear friends of the Foundation,**

I joined the Foundation in February 2020, shortly after the departure of our former Executive Director, Dawn Hank. After five short weeks of working in the office to train and meet with community partners, supporters, and donors, the COVID-19 pandemic was in full swing and we started working from home.

New challenges were introduced to the school district, area nonprofits, and the business community. It was a time to be creative and to think of new and innovative ways to collaborate with students, teachers, business partners, and the community. The mission of the Foundation stood strong throughout the hardships our community, state, country, and world faced. We were able to support the school district in providing an excellent education to the thousands of WBLAS students and over 600 teachers.

In the 2019-2020 school year:

- The Foundation granted nearly \$35,000 in student scholarships that assisted them in pursuing their post-secondary education goals.
- The Foundation awarded \$45,000 in teacher grants that provided district educators with opportunities to provide new and creative teaching experiences in their classrooms along with professional development opportunities.
- We are thankful for the popular Angel Fund that allows district students and families access to clothing, food, shelter, and other basic needs at no cost. In Spring of 2020, we added specific

funding for COVID-19 relief for the families needing additional assistance. Some of the expenses we were able to cover included food, internet, utilities, and clothing.

The Foundation is strong, thanks to the support of all of you, our friends, business partners, donors, volunteers, and constituents. As the board of directors continues to implement the Foundation's goals and initiatives, we are committed to our mission to all students and teachers in the district.

Many years ago, I read a quote that has had a significant impact on me: "The foundation of every state is the education of its youth." (Diogenes, n.d.). This quote guides my work each day and brings meaning to each task we complete together. The teachers and students are the reason we do our work. We are here to support and encourage them to reach their full potential. We are a community and together we will work to provide all students the opportunities they need to succeed and thrive.

### **SPOTLIGHT:**

#### **OTTER LAKE ELEMENTARY WEATHER STATION**

The Outdoor Weather Station at Otter Lake Elementary is a large interactive display of weather instruments. It will help students have access to scientific tools in order to measure weather conditions during all types of weather and learn about the environment of Minnesota. The instruments are fixed in place and located at heights that are easy for children to read and aid them in making weather observations. Students have access to the Outdoor Weather Station during recess, playtime, BEAR Breaks, and when using the Otter Trail & the Prairie School Outdoor Classroom.

#### E3 GRANT

The E3 Grant, created from Legacy Funds was established to further WBLAS students' understanding and attitudes toward science, the outdoors, our community, and the world. Additional environmental learning opportunities can transform our students by endowing them with increased academic skills, civic and community leadership, environmental stewardship, and global awareness. Our goal is to provide opportunities for the students in our district to become inspired and responsible environmental leaders. The Foundation awarded \$4,474 to this team for the **Outdoor Weather Station Grant Project** in the 2019-2020 calendar year. An additional \$12,000 was distributed to Elementary Schools for Environmental Camps.

The Brosious Teaching Grant is designed to enhance the rigor of the curriculum or instruction within the classroom, providing a rich learning experience for all students. The Foundation awarded \$19,447 in the 2019-2020 school year to the recipients here below:

This project was designed to enhance the learning experience of the students by providing them with an inspiring setting and expanding range of opportunities in the Media Center as WBLAS transition to a system that ensures students are the primary agent in their learning. This grant helped provide funds to purchase flip top nesting tables, orange sled base stack chairs, and overstuffed bean bag chairs.

This grant helped students purchase applances, including a coffee grinder and expresso machine/brewer for the student run *School Grounds* Coffee shop that will be housed in the new combined all campus high school.

This grant provided funds for the creation of multilingual books to be used in the Family Literacy class. Photo books will be created so that young learners can see themselves in the books and parents can read the books to their children.

This grant allowed Language Arts teachers to purchase five document cameras and will impact almost 1,000 students.




Paige Pinnow South Campus

David Melvin North Campus

This grant helped fund a Guitar Club that will be formed at North Campus during Bear Time (a relationship building/club activities/ academic support during the school day) for a group of 6-15 students from both general education and special education backgrounds. Students will gain knowledge and instruction on playing techniques, theory and music reading while playing together to compose music.

The Ryan Family Art Grant awards elementary teachers typicallly up to \$500 per teacher or team for the purchase of art supplies, instructional materials, or to assist with the expenses of an Artist-in-Residence. This project conceptualized the central idea that people use art to express feelings, points of view, and to connect with the world around them. Progressive mini-lessons were designed for students to experiment with the elements and principles of art in a variety of visual mediums. Students were asked to create three-dimensional work based on historical artists or art movements. This year the project was to be expanded to include Ojibwa Bags to enhance Native American connections. \*Delayed due to pandemic.

## SPOTLIGHT BIKES FOR BEARS




The "Bikes for Bears" Grant helped fund equipment for the District's TAPP program (Transition and Post-Secondary Preparation) for Special Education students, ages 17-21 with significant learning deficits.

The equipment included: an adult tricycle, bikes, bike helmets, bike locks and outside games including croquet and bocce ball. The equipment will be used to connect Special Education students with real life experiences outdoors, to help improve overall mental health and well being.

#### ANGEL FUND

#### The Angel Fund gives our community an opportunity to share with those in need right in our own school district.

White Bear Lake students and their families face challenges everyday; some more than others. The White Bear Lake Area Educational Foundation is compassionate and committed in its efforts to help families in need.

#### OFFERING A HAND UP RATHER THAN A HAND OUT

The relief and gratitude expressed by the families we help goes from a heart wrenching arrival to a very heartwarming departure. If needed, the Foundation's Angel Fund has stepped up to provide additional financial support to The Closet when we are out of stock or specific sizes. The Angel fund is extremely helpful in meeting various important family necessities. Last fall we serviced a family living out of their car. Amongst their selections we included warm, tied fleece blankets handmade by kindergarteners and elementary students within the district donated from annual service projects. This past spring we helped a family who lost their belongings in a house fire. The list is long of those we have been able to assist.




#### THE CLOSET

In 2011, former board president Kim Schoonover established the Closet to extend an opportunity for families to shop for clothing free of charge in a safe, supportive and confidential environment. Located in the Area Learning Center, the Closet has had a very positive and successful impact within the White Bear Lake community. Research shows students are more successful in their learning when they are wearing comfortable and appropriate clothing. We service an average of 100 families a year and provide clothing needs to approximately 175-200 children and many adults.

#### **COVID-19 RELIEF FUND**

When our schools closed in March, there was an uncertainty how students on free and reduced lunch would continue to receive their daily nutrition. Several White Bear Lake area restaurants immediately stepped up to serve free breakfast and lunch to those children. The Foundation quickly established the **COVID-19 Fund** using Angel Fund dollars and partnered with these businesses to help finance the cost of some food for an interim week as the district worked on a plan to meet these needs. The **COVID-19 fund** continues to be used during these unprecedented times when needs extend beyond The Closet and Angel Fund.



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
